### India Test-Launches New Agni-Series Nuclear-Capable Missile- Janes

India's government-run Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) test-launched the latest variant of its Agni family of nuclear-cjapanapable ballistic missiles on 28 June off the coast of the eastern state of Odisha. Named 'Agni P' (Prime), the indigenously developed canisterised missile, which was launched from Abdul Kalam Island – formerly known as Wheeler Island – met "all mission objectives with a high level of accuracy", said the Indian government's Press Information Bureau (PIB) in a statement, adding that the launch was tracked by various telemetry and radar stations.

# UK signs agreement to support enhancement of Ukrainian naval capabilities – UK GOV

The Ukrainian Ministry of Defence, the UK government, and Babcock announced on 23<sup>rd</sup> June that they had signed a memorandum of implementation (MOI) on the Royal Navy Type 45 destroyer HMS Defender in the Black Sea port of Odesa to push forward the Ukrainian Naval Capabilities Enhancement Programme (UNCEP).

The MOI builds on an agreement signed on HMS Prince of Wales in October 2020, under which £1.25bn is to be spent to strengthen the Ukrainian Navy.

# Russia says warning shots deter UK warship; London denies it – <u>Defence News</u>

The Russian military said one of its warships in the Black Sea fired warning shots and a warplane dropped bombs Wednesday to force a British destroyer away from an area near Crimea that Moscow claims as its territorial waters, but Britain denied that account and insisted its ship wasn't fired upon.

It was the first time since the Cold War that Moscow has claimed to have used live ammunition to deter a NATO warship, reflecting the growing risk of military incidents amid soaring tensions between Russia and the West.
